SUBJECT: Commerce Committee Hearings - News Broadcasts

I have just attended hearings conducted by the Honorable Harley Staggers, Chairman of the Commerce Committee of the House of Representatives. My main regret is that each of you could not have been present to hear the sincere appeal of this dedicated public servant for vigilance in the important job of reporting the news.

I have discussed this matter with network representatives who don't think it could happen to their stations, but there are far too many instances where reporters state news events. It only has to happen once before a station's reliability can be atruly injured, if not destroyed. There is frequently a desire on the part of a reporter or a cameraman, who may arrive late or whose equipment might have malfunctioned, to ask for a repeat of an event which has already taken place. It seems to me if this happens, there should be an admission of that fact if the event is restaged.

Our industry is under constant attack, our detractors are happy to emphasize indiscretions, and we simply can't afford to take any chances. I appeal to you individually to keep very close tabs on any possibilities of these unethical practices. I believe it is vitally important that you constantly remind news directors as well as those on the firingline as reporters how serious a matter this is.

I believe Chairman Staggers is most sincere when he explains his only goal in having these hearings is to help us all be more reliable broadcasters. Today he emphasized that in his mind television has the finest opportunity of doing good of any facet of today's society. I, for one, am grateful there are men of his calibre who care enough to keep us on our toes.
