Mine Safety and Health Act

H.R. 13555 - Passed House July 28. (vote of 309 to 86)

Senate bill S. 1302 - has been marked up and ordered out of committee. Not printed yet.

Provides for improved safety procedures, penalties, training.

Both bills provide for transfer of MESA to Labor out of Interior, the feeling being that Interior Dept. is more concerned with energy and Labor Dept would be more sympathetic with the workers' safety. (This is the feature which has aroused most discussion.)

UMWA favors the bill. - per Labor Subcommittee.

American Mining Congress opposes and had recommended to RCB that the bill passed by House be referred to Govt. Operations instead of Interior--as a stalling tactic until, they said, a better bill could be written. Jack Arant, of Mining Congress, approached Senator on this because they felt Senator would oppose transfer of MESA to Labor. This organization feels a better bill is needed and that industry, miners and govt. can sit down and work up a bill. (The one under consideration was written by the United Steelworkers, according to Arant.) This spokesman also stated that Dr. Korn, Asst. Secretary of Labor, has indicated he does not want to see MESA transferred to his office.)

Aside from transfer of MESA, the bill would repeal the Non-Coal safety Law (Metallic Mine Safety) and establish one safety law applicable to coal and non-coal industries; would provide a single uniform procedure for developing standards applicable to all mines and standardize enforcement procedures; upgrade the enforcement in both metal and non-metal operations ~~of~~ of safety standards, providing civil penalties. Included in the civil procedures would be one providing for an injunctive type of relief by a district court for habitual safety offenders. Would provide for civil closure orders instead of a fine in major safety offenses-- protecting the miners' salaries while mine is closed for correction of hazards. Bill would correct observed deficiencies in training of miners in safety practices. It limits the number of times an operator can have a trial on the same offenses
